H.R. 3590: The Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act

Key Prevention Provisions:

- *Establishes a “Prevention and Public Health Investment Fund” (Sec. 4002)*
- *Creates the National Prevention, Health Promotion And Public Health Council (Sec. 4001)*
- *Requires National Prevention And Health Promotion Strategy (Sec. 4001)*
- *Creates “Community Transformation” grants (Sec. 4201)*
- *Directs CDC Director to convene an independent “Community Preventive Services Task Force” (Sec. 4003)*

H.R. 3590: SEC. 4002.
Prevention And Public Health Fund

(a) PURPOSE.—It is the purpose of this section to establish a Prevention and Public Health Fund (referred to in this section as the “Fund”), to be administered through the Department of Health and Human Services, Office of the Secretary, to provide for expanded and sustained national investment in prevention and public health programs to improve health and help restrain the rate of growth in private and public sector health care costs.

H.R. 3590: SEC. 4002.
Prevention And Public Health Fund

(b) FUNDING.—There are hereby authorized to be appropriated, and appropriated, to the Fund, out of any monies in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated—(1) for fiscal year 2010, \$500,000,000; (2) for fiscal year 2011, \$750,000,000; (3) for fiscal year 2012, \$1,000,000,000; (4) for fiscal year 2013, \$1,250,000,000; (5) for fiscal year 2014, \$1,500,000,000; and (6) for fiscal year 2015, and each fiscal year thereafter, \$2,000,000,000.

H.R. 3590: SEC. 4002.
Prevention And Public Health Fund

(c) USE OF FUND.—The Secretary shall transfer amounts in the Fund to accounts within the Department of Health and Human Services to increase funding, over the fiscal year 2008 level, for programs authorized by the Public Health Service Act, for prevention, wellness, and public health activities including prevention research and health screenings, such as the Community Transformation grant program, the Education and Outreach Campaign for Preventive Benefits, and immunization programs.

Overview of Prevention Trust Fund Funding

\$250 Million to Bolster the Primary Care Workforce

- Create additional primary care residency slots (\$168 million)
- Support physician assistant training in primary care (\$32 million)
- Encourage students to pursue full-time nursing careers (\$30 million)
- Establish new nurse practitioner-led clinics (\$15 million)
- Encourage states to address needs of the health professional workforce (\$5 million)

Overview of Prevention Trust Fund Funding

\$250 Million to Bolster the Prevention and Wellness

*Allocation #1: Community and Clinical Prevention
(\$126 million)*

- *Putting Prevention to Work (\$74 million).*
- *Primary and Behavioral Health Integration (\$20 million).*
- *Obesity Prevention and Fitness (\$16 million).*
- *Tobacco Cessation (\$16 million).*

Overview of Prevention Trust Fund Funding

\$250 Million to Bolster the Prevention and Wellness

Allocation #2: Public Health Infrastructure (\$70 million)

- *Improved information technology, workforce training, and regulation and policy development (\$50 million) .*
- *Epidemiology and Laboratory Capacity Grants (\$20 million).*

Overview of Prevention Trust Fund Funding

\$250 Million to Bolster the Prevention and Wellness

Allocation #3: Research and Tracking (\$31 million)

- *Surveillance, data collection and analysis (\$21 million).*
- *Community Preventive Services Task Force (\$5 million).*
- *Clinical Preventive Services Task Force (\$5 million).*

\$250 Million to Bolster the Prevention and Wellness

Allocation #4: Public Health Training (\$23 million)

- *CDC Public Health Workforce Programs (\$8 million).*
- *Public Health Training Centers (\$15 million).*

Implementing the Affordable Care Act: Principles for Prevention

Segment Two

Draft Principles for Prevention Investment

1. Invest in strategies that will both address multiple health and safety outcomes and substantively reduce the burden on the health care system
2. Emphasize communities with the greatest gaps in health status and the greatest disease and injury burden
3. Focus on environments (communities, schools, workplaces)
4. Directly engage and fund communities

Draft Principles for Prevention Investment (continued)

5. Reflect a comprehensive health system by linking to and complementing health care activities
6. Encourage multisectoral partnerships and collaboration
7. Change policy, organizational practice, and norms
8. Build on existing evidence and experience
9. Create sustainable change
